

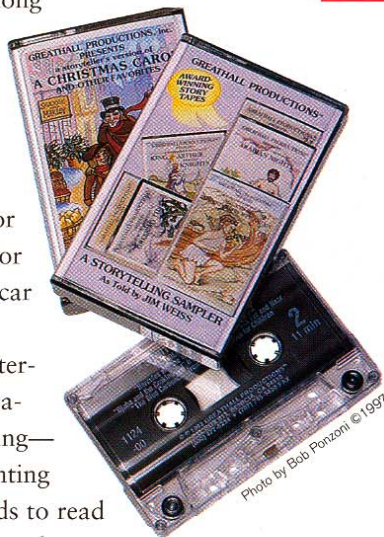
He's A Classic Storyteller

There's nothing like a good story that's told well. And Jim Weiss, master storyteller, has lots of good stories. His hour-long cassettes and CDs, distributed through the mom-and-pop company that Weiss and his wife, Randy, began out of their home in 1989, are great for family evenings together, for bedtime or for those long car rides.

A mix of traditional entertainment and literary education, Weiss' vivid storytelling—which, rather than supplanting the classics, encourages kids to read them—has won more than a dozen awards from parents' magazines, librarians, the recording industry and toy associations.

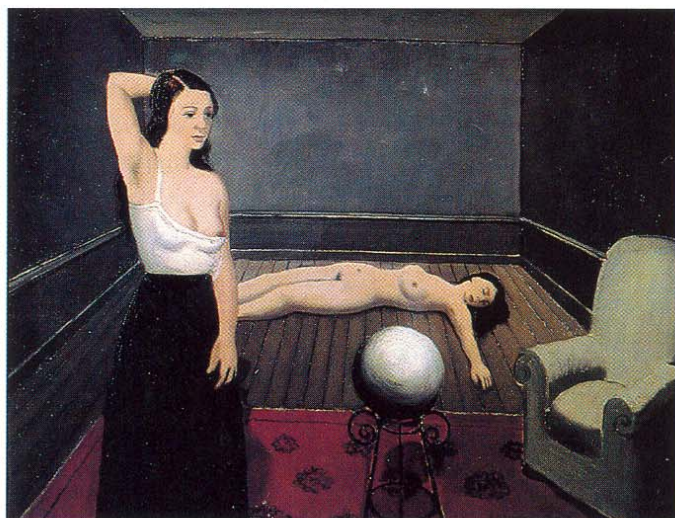
Brussels Celebrates A Birthday

Takin' Home The Ritz (From London)

No longer is it enough to have merely visited the swank **Ritz Hotel** in the heart of London's fashionable West End on Green Park: Some people, unfortunately, must prove it—with a souvenir or two.

At the center of collectors' attention are the hotel's distinctive French-made, 3-inch-by-3-inch porcelain ashtrays that bear the Ritz name and stylish coat of arms. And these objets d'art at one time were disappearing in record quantities, according to General



Manager Luc Delafosse. (Of course, you'll never find an ashtray in *your* purse or attaché case.)

Outpacing the ashtrays, however, have been the hotel's decorative menus that detail the Ritz's sumptuous high-tea offerings at its Palm Court restaurant. Being a sought-after commodity, it seems, is a Ritz tradition. Even for ashtrays and menus.
