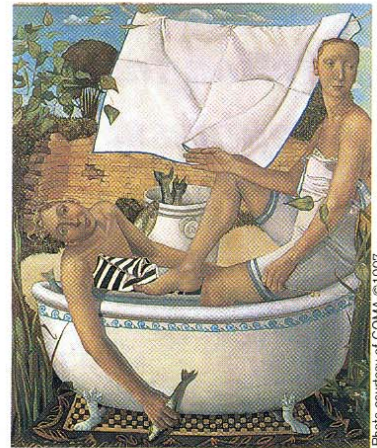

Glasgow's Artistic Mod Squad

Destined to become one of Britain's most important contemporary art centers, the Gallery of Modern

Art (GOMA) in Glasgow, Scotland, is wasting little time living up to its own press.

History Afloat In Sacramento

Alive and well in California: the *Delta King*, identical twin of the *Delta Queen*, of Mississippi River fame. Both were built in the '20s and plied the Sacramento River during Prohibition,

serving up liquor, jazz and gambling. Come World War II, they were pressed into service by the Navy and served in San Francisco Bay as floating barracks and hospital ships. After the war, the

Queen became famous while the *King* languished and sank, a victim of vandalism, fire, lawsuits and leaks. In 1984, the *King* was floated and towed to a permanent mooring in Old Sacramento, California, where today, restored to
